Food Safety in a Disaster: Prepare Ahead!

- Good relationship with facilities is key to preparing for a disaster
- If a storm is known and may affect establishments, make contact

Food Safety After a Storm:

Information for Food Service Establishments

Plan Ahead

- Check refrigeration and freezers for working thermometers
- Store canned food and single service on higher shelves to avoid flood waters
- Freeze any food that is not immediately needed before a big storm

When to Close

- No electricity and/or water
- Insufficient water pressure for cleaning and/or handwashing
- · Wastewater back-up or damage to septic system
- Damage to walls or roof that cause potential for food contamination
- Flood waters present inside food establishment

Cleaning up


- When in doubt, THROW IT OUT
- Clean and sanitize utensils, equipment, and food contact surfaces
- Discard food or single service utensils that contacted flood water
- Check food temperatures and discard time/temperature control for safety (TCS) foods that have been out of temperature for >4


